The 47th meeting of the Executive Council of Central University of Haryana was held on Tuesday, December 29, 2020 at 12 Noon in the Conference Room, New Administrative Block, Central University of Haryana, Mahendergarh, Haryana.

At the outset, the Vice-Chancellor welcomed all the members of the Executive Council. The members were informed about the demise of Prof(Dr.) P.L. Chaturvedi, Hon'ble Chancellor, Central University of Haryana. The Council remembered his contribution and paid tribute to him. Thereafter the Vice-Chancellor shared the following Brief Development Report of the University with all the members of the Council:

- Students Enrolment:** For the current academic session (2020-21), the University has offered admissions to 8 UG programmes, 31 PG programmes, 7 M.Phil programmes and 26 Ph.D programmes under 34 departments through CUCET. More than 48% students belong to 26 States other than Haryana

- ii. **NET/JRF/GATE:** 175 Students of the University qualified UGC/CSIR – NET/JRF or GATE during 2019-20, and 70 students qualified UGC-NET/JRF in June 2020 examinations.
- iii. **Publications: during 2019-20 (239)-** Research Papers in UGC CARE-Listed/Refereed journals – 195; Books- 09; and Book Chapters- 74.
- iv. **Research and Consultancy Projects:** During 2019-20- 41 research /consultancy projects (completed/ ongoing and sanctioned during the session)
- v. **MOOCs:** The University developed its first MOOC course on “Food Microbiology and Food Safety” and it completed its third cycle from January 2020 to May 2020 with an enrolment of 3607 learners from more than 22 prestigious universities/institutes and food industries. In view of the popularity of the course, CEC-UGC Academic Advisory Council approved re-run of this course on SWAYAM Portal for the semester July-December 2020. The University has established five virtual classrooms for recording and production of MOOCs and e-contents with advanced features like Video Content Management System and Live Webcasting.
- vi. **National Resource Centre:** The Ministry of Human Resource Development has identified Central University of Haryana for setting up National Resource Centre for developing modules for MOOC on “Personal-Emotional Development and Counselling”.
- vii. **Global Initiative for Academic Network (GIAN):** During 2019-20, the University conducted five GIAN programmes with foreign experts from Emory University, Shandong University, University of Minho-Portugal and Gaikwad Steroidomics Lab, USA. So far, 15 GIAN courses have been conducted.
- viii. **Training Partner of Food Safety and Standards Authority of India (FSSAI):** Food Safety and Standards Authority of India, Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, approved the Food safety training Centre of Central University of Haryana. During the year, the Centre imparted industrial training to 120 candidates from various disciplines of Life Sciences.
- ix. **Status of Online Education and its Monitoring during Corona Pandemic period:**
- All the departments started teaching online w.e.f. 1st August, 2020 as per the scheduled time table.
 - All 182 teachers are actively involved in online education.
 - LMS of CUH is successfully migrated from INFLIBNET’s server to CUH server.
 - 260 courses of 36 subjects are being taught in CUH and are made available on CUH’s LMS platform.
 - Apart from LMS resources, students are also utilizing 120+ e-content/ e-documents prepared by 94 teachers and 52 video lectures developed by 42 teachers using CUH’s virtual classrooms.

- Top three online learning platforms/tools being used by the faculty/students for online teaching/learning are: Google Classroom, Google Meet and WhatsApp. The other tools being used are: Zoom, SKYPE, A-View, Cisco WebeX, CUH-LMS, SWAYAM, etc.
- Students and faculty are accessing e-resources remotely with the use of INFED platform of INFLIBNET.
- Access to over 6200 e-books has been given to the students and teachers of the University.
- Successfully conducted online remote proctoring examination of 2447 students for the session 2019-20.
- CUH has organized more than 150+ academic events of national and university level in the last 10 months.

**PROGRAMMES LEADING TO THE AWARD OF THE BACHELOR OF LAWS
(3-YEAR) PROFESSIONAL DEGREE**

1. DEFINITION OF KEYWORDS

1.1 Choice-Based Credit System (CBCS) The CBCS provides a choice for the students to select a course from the prescribed courses (Elective or soft-skill courses). It provides a 'cafeteria' approach in which the students can take courses of their choice, learn at their own pace, study additional courses and acquire more than the minimum required credits, and adopt an inter-disciplinary approach to learning.

1.2 Academic Year

Two consecutive (one odd + one even) semesters shall constitute one academic year.

1.3 Semester

Each Semester shall consist of 15-18 weeks of academic work equivalent to 90 actual teaching days. The odd semester may be scheduled from July to December and even semester from January to June. The credit-based semester system provides flexibility in designing curriculum and assigning credits based on the course content and hours of teaching.

1.4 Credit

Credit is a unit by which the course work is measured. It determines the number of hours of instructions required per week. One credit is equivalent to one hour of teaching (lecture or tutorial) or two hours of practical work/fieldwork, per week.

Credits: A credit defines the quantum of contents/syllabus prescribed for a course and determines the number of hours of instruction required per week. Thus, in each course, credits are assigned based on the number of lectures/tutorials/laboratory work/fieldwork and other forms of learning required for completing the contents in a 15-week schedule. 2 hours of laboratory work/fieldwork is generally considered equivalent to 1 hour of lecture. (i) 1 credit = 1 hour of instruction per week (1 credit course = 15 contact hours of instruction per semester) (ii) 3 credits = 3 hours of instruction per week (3 credit course = 45 contact hours of instruction per Semester) (iii) 1 credit = 1 hour of tutorial per week (1 credit course = 15 contact hours of instruction per semester). A core/elective course with the practical component may carry up to 6 credits while a core/elective course without practical component may carry up to 5 credits. However, a dissertation/ project work/internship/fieldwork may carry up to 16 credits (along with other core/elective courses); and a semester-long dissertation/project work/internship/fieldwork may carry up to 24 credits.

1.5 Grade Point

It is a numerical weightage allotted to each letter grade on a 10-point scale.

1.6 Letter Grade

It is an index of the performance of students in a said course. Grades are denoted by letters O, A+, A, B+, B, C, P and F. It implies a letter grade assigned to a student based on evaluation of a course on a ten-point scale.

1.7 Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA)

It is a measure of performance of the work done in a semester. It is the ratio of total credit points secured by a student in various courses registered in a semester and the total course credits taken during that semester. It shall be expressed up to two decimal places.

1.8 Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA)

It is a measure of the overall cumulative performance of a student's through all the semesters. The CGPA is the ratio of total credit points secured by a student in various courses in all semesters and the sum of the total credits of all courses in all the semesters. It is expressed up to two decimal places.

1.9 Transcript/ Grade Card or Certificate

Based on the grades earned, a grade certificate shall be issued to all the registered students after every semester. The grade certificate will display the course details (code, title, number of credits, grade secured) along with SGPA of that semester and CGPA earned till that semester.

1.10 Course

Usually referred to as paper, it is a component of a Programme. All courses need not carry the same weight. Each course should define the learning objectives and learning outcomes. A course may be designed to comprise lectures/tutorials/laboratory work/fieldwork/outreach, activities/ project work/dissertation/practical training/viva/seminars/term, papers/assignments/ presentations/self-study work/clinical component, etc., or a combination of some of these.

1.11 Type of Courses

Each programme may have three types of courses, viz. Core courses, Elective courses, and Self-study/Skill-based courses.

1.12 Core Courses

The core courses are those courses whose knowledge is deemed essential for the students registered for a programme of study.

1.13 Elective Courses

The elective courses can be chosen from a pool of papers. These courses are intended to allow the student to specialize in one or more branches of the broad subject area; help the student to acquire knowledge and skills in a related area that may have applications in the broad subject area, and help the student to bridge any gap in the curriculum; enable acquisition of essential skills, and help the student to pursue a specific area of interest.

The student may also choose additional elective courses offered by the University to enable him/her to acquire extra credits from the discipline, or across the discipline.

1.14 Self-study/Skill-based Courses

The self-study courses, if offered, are optional, not mandatory. Being non-credit courses, the performance of students in these courses shall be indicated either as "satisfactory" or as "unsatisfactory", instead of the Letter Grade and this shall not be counted for the computation of SGPA/CGPA.

2. Programme

2.1 The duration of the Programme for the Bachelor of Laws (LL.B.) (3 Year) Professional Course, will be three academic years which will be divided into six semesters.

2.2 Each semester shall have a minimum of 90 working days. Examination for the First, Third and Fifth semester shall ordinarily be held in December/January and for the Second, Fourth and Sixth semester in May/June on such dates as may be fixed by the university.

2.3 The candidate for re-appear of the odd semester will take the examination in the next odd semester and the candidate for re-appear of even semester will take the examination in the next even semester. However, the candidate for re-appear in the sixth semester will take the examination in the next odd semester.

3. Eligibility for Admission

3.1 An applicant, who has obtained a bachelor's degree in any stream from a University or an equivalent institution recognized as deemed to be University or from a foreign University declared as equivalent to an Indian Degree by a competent authority, shall be eligible to join the First year of the LL.B. (3 year) Professional course.

3.2 Minimum qualifying marks in graduation: 45% for Un-reserved Category and relaxation of 5% to the SC/ST/PWD/ OBC (Non-Creamy Layer) candidates.

3.3 There is no minimum age requirement for admission to three years law degree course.

4. Duration of the Programme:

The duration of the Programme for the Bachelor of Laws (LL.B.) (3-Year) Professional Course, will be three academic years which will be divided into six semesters, and each semester shall have 90 teaching days.

Provided that a semester or a year may be declared by the Academic Council a zero semester or a zero year for a student if he/she could not continue with the academic work during that period due to illness and hospitalization, or due to accepting a scholarship/fellowship subject to the fulfillment of requirements laid down in this respect by the regulations. Such a zero semester/year shall not be counted for calculation of the duration of the programme in the case of such a student.

5. Mobility Options and Credit Transfers:

5.1 The students shall be permitted to opt inter-disciplinary and horizontal mobility and can take courses of their choice, learn at their paces, undergo additional courses, acquire more than the required credits, and adopt an interdisciplinary approach to learning.

5.2 The mobility across the disciplines is also subject to availability of the desired elective course, faculty, infrastructure and no. of students (as fixed by the University/department from time to time) opting that elective course.

5.3 Mobility of Credits earned by the students from GIAN (Global Initiative of Academic Networks) courses/ MOOCs (Massive Open Online Courses)/ SWAYAM (Study Webs of Active --Learning for Young Aspiring Minds)/ Swachh Bharat Internship Programme/ etc. shall be credited in accordance with the provisions made under the respective schemes, as amended from time to time; subject to compatibility of course content & assessment process with the prior approval of the Board of Studies/ School Board of the Department/School.

6. Course Coding:

Each course offered by a school/department is identified by a unique course code indicating school, department, programme, semester, course no., core (C) /elective course (E), Serial No. of the course, No. of credits attached to lectures, tutorials, the practical and total number of credits for the course respectively. For example, the course code for the fifth core course of the third programme in the second semester in the Department of Law under the School of Law carrying 5 credits (4 lectures and one tutorial) may be- SL LAW 03 02 05 C 4105. However, the concerned Board of Studies/School Board may recommend a specific course codification pattern for the approval of the Academic Council.

7. Student Advisor:

The Department shall appoint an Advisor for each student from amongst the members of the faculty concerned. All faculty members of the department shall function as Student Advisors and shall have an equal number of students. The Student Advisor shall advise the student in the selection of courses and shall render all possible support, guidance and counseling to him/her.

8. Course Registration:

8.1 The registration for courses shall be the sole responsibility of the student. No student shall be allowed to do a course without registration, and no student shall be entitled to any credits in the course unless he/she has been registered for the course by the scheduled date fixed by the University.

8.2 Every student must register (Offline / Online) in each semester (in consultation with his/her Student Advisor) for the courses he/she intends to undergo in that semester by applying in the prescribed proforma duly signed by him/her, the Student Advisor and the Head of the Department, within the deadline notified for the purpose by the University.

8.3 Late registration may be permitted by the Head/ In charge of the Department up to a maximum of six weeks after the commencement of the semester, on payment of late fee prescribed by the university.

8.4 A student shall register for a minimum of 20 credits and can register for a maximum of 30 credits in a semester (subject to 160 (± 6) credits throughout the three-year LL.B programme), unless specified otherwise by the University.

8.5 Withdrawal from a course may be permitted up to two weeks from the date of registration, provided the courses registered after withdrawal shall enable the student to earn a minimum of 20 credits. Withdrawal from a course may not be allowed for those who had late registration.

8.6 A student may be allowed by the Head/In charge of the Department to add a course or substitute a course for another course of the same type (elective or self-study/skill-based), for valid reasons with the consent of the Student Advisor not later than two weeks from the date of commencement of the semester.

8.7 If a student registers himself/herself for more elective courses than the prescribed in the programme, while calculating the Semester/Cumulative Grade Point Average, only the prescribed number of elective courses for the programme of study shall be included in the descending order of the grades obtained by him/her.

8.8 The elective courses opted and registered by the student either from the parent or other department and attempted in the end semester examination shall have to be qualified. Such elective courses shall not be replaced. However, a student shall have the option of choosing an elective course from other departments irrespective of the semester in which the course is offered. For example; a student of odd/even Semester can opt an elective course of other departments offered in any odd/even semester respectively.

9. Minimum Credit Requirements

For the three-year LL.B programme, the credit requirements for the professional degree shall be 160 credits (± 6 Credits), including a minimum of 32 credits from elective courses of which 12 credits shall be from elective courses offered by other Departments.

10. Classroom Teaching and Skill Development Activities

For each paper/course, four hours per week shall be assigned for classroom teaching and one hour for professional skills development activities. As per Bar Council of India Guidelines, the course leading to LL. B (Three-year) shall be conducted in semester system in not less than 15 weeks (6 days a week)/18 week (5 days a week), and each week shall have not less than 30 hours for teaching, moot court, tutorial, skill development activities, etc.

11. Examination and Internal Assessment

The internal assessment work and the End-Semester examination shall have a weightage of 30% and 70%, respectively. For practical examination also, 70 percent of the marks will be awarded through an end semester practical exam and the remaining 30 percent of the marks will consist of internal assessment to be awarded by the concerned course coordinator (s) of the concerned department. Maximum 05 marks to be awarded for attendance of students (Same as mentioned in case of internal assessment for theory examination)

Assessment of Seminar paper: The seminar paper shall be assessed based on the contents of the paper submitted and its presentation, equally. The assessment will be made by the concerned teacher/advisor/supervisor. A Seminar presentation paper will not exceed 4 credits per semester.

12. Internal Assessment

12.1 Internal Assessment shall be done continuously, considering the student's class performance, completion of assignments and performance in the minimum two compulsory sessional tests to be conducted in a semester. For the sake of uniformity, particularly for interdepartmental transfer of credits, there shall be a uniform procedure of examination to be adopted by all faculty members.

12.2 The first Internal Assessment Test shall be held around the sixth week of the semester for the syllabi covered till then, and the second Internal Assessment Test shall be held around the twelfth week for the syllabi covered between seventh and twelfth week. However, the department may make the provision for more than two tests also.

12.3 For conducting Internal Assessment, one or more assessment tools, such as written tests, assignments, oral quizzes, paper presentations, laboratory work, etc., suitable to the course may be employed.

12.4 The Internal Assessment for theory shall consist of the following components with marks indicated against each:

(i) Attendance:

Below 75%	5 marks
75% to <80%	Nil
80 % to <85%	1 Mark
85% to <90%	2 Marks
90% to <95%	3 Marks
95% and above	4 Marks
	5 Marks

Note: 75 % attendance is the minimum requirement for students to be eligible for exams.

(ii) Assignments/Presentations and Class Participation **5 Marks**

(iii) Internal Assessments **20 Marks**

Test-1 10 Marks

Test-2 10 Marks

The Head/ In charge of the Department may allow a student to repeat one sessional test, if his/her application in this regard is considered as genuine on valid reasons.

A student is required to secure a minimum of 'P' grade in the Internal Assessment and in the End-Semester examinations in the aggregate. However, he/she shall have to pass the practical examination separately, with a minimum of 'P' grade.

13. The medium of instructions in the classroom shall be English. The question paper will be set in English only. However, the medium of examination may be English or Hindi.
14. Candidates shall be examined according to the Scheme of Examination and Syllabus as approved by the Academic Council from time to time. A candidate who fails in an examination or fails to appear in an examination, shall unless approved otherwise by the Academic Council, take the examination according to the syllabus prescribed by the University for regular students appearing for that examination.
15. A candidate for the LL. B (Professional) degree, must pass the whole examination (all six semesters) within Five Years of his admission into the LL. B (professional) course first Semester Class, failing which he/she will be de-registered from the programme.
16. The Details of the internship / Practical Training (Court Visit, Moot Court, etc.) to be imparted as per syllabus of LL.B. (3 year) professional course students will be notified by the Head of the Department of Law, from time to time.
17. A candidate who has already passed the LL.B. Examination from this university may appear in one or more other additional subjects at any subsequent examination without attending a regular course of study. The examination fee shall be such; as notified by the Controller of Examinations from time to time.
18. The procedure for End-Semester Examination, Calculation of Letter Grades and Grade Points, Setting of Question Papers and Evaluation, Re-appear Examination/Improvement of Grades, Re-evaluation/Rechecking, Computation of SGPA and CGPA, Attendance Requirement, Conversion Formula, Removal of the Student from the Programme, Promotion Rules and other miscellaneous provisions/details shall be in accordance with relevant clauses of **Ordinance-XV relating to "PROGRAMMES LEADING TO THE AWARD OF POSTGRADUATE**

DEGREES/DIPLOMAS” and other relevant Ordinances/Rules of the University, as amended from time to time.

Notwithstanding anything stated in this Ordinance, for any unforeseen issue arising, and not covered by this Ordinance, or in the event of a difference in interpretation, the Vice-Chancellor may take an appropriate decision.

Ordinance XXXIII

**PROGRAMMES LEADING TO THE AWARD OF THE MASTER OF PHARMACY
(M. PHARM.) DEGREE**

1. Definitions of Key Words:

- 1.1. **‘Academic Year’**: Two consecutive (one odd + one even) semesters shall constitute one academic year.
- 1.2. **‘Course’**: Usually referred to as paper and is a component of a Programme. All courses need not carry the same weightage. A course may be designed to comprise lectures/tutorials/laboratory work/field work/outreach activities/ project work/ industrial/ vocational training/ viva/ seminars/ term papers/ assignments/ presentations/ self-study work, etc., or a combination of some of these.
- 1.3. **‘Credit’**: A unit by which the course work is measured. It determines the number of hours of instructions required per week. One credit is equivalent to one hour of teaching (lecture or tutorial) or two hours of practical work/field work, per week.
- 1.4. **‘Credit Point’**: It is the product of the grade point and the number of credits for a course.
- 1.5. **‘Credit-Based Semester System (CBSS)’**: Under the CBSS, the requirement for awarding a degree or diploma or certificate is prescribed in terms of the number of credits to be earned by the student.
- 1.6. **‘Cumulative Grade- Point Average (CGPA)’**: It is a measure for the cumulative performance of a student for cumulative semesters. The CGPA is calculated with the SGPA of all the IV semesters up to two decimal points and is indicated in final grade report card/final transcript showing the grades of all IV semesters and their courses.
- 1.7. **‘Grade Point’**: It is a numerical weightage allotted to each letter grade.
- 1.8. **‘Letter Grade’**: It is an index of the performance of students in a said course. Grades are denoted by letters O, A, B, C, D, F, and AB which means a letter grade assigned to a student on the basis of evaluation of a course on a ten-point scale.
- 1.9. **‘Programme’**: An educational programme leading to the award of a Master of Pharmacy (M. Pharm.) Degree.

- 1.10. **'Pharmacy Council of India'**: The Pharmacy Council of India (PCI) is the statutory body of government of India, also called as central council, constituted under the Pharmacy Act, 1948.
- 1.11. **'Semester'**: Each Semester shall consist of not less than 100 working days. The odd semesters shall be conducted from the month of June/July to November/December and the even semesters shall be conducted from the month of December/January to May/June in every calendar year.
- 1.12. **'Semester Grade-Point Average (SGPA)'**: It is a measure of performance of the work done in a semester. The SGPA is the weighted average of the grade points obtained in all the courses by the student during the semester.
- 1.13. **'Transcript' / 'Grade- Card' or 'Certificate'**: Based on the grades earned, a grade certificate shall be issued to all the registered students after every semester. The grade certificate will display the course details (code, title, number of credits, grade secured) along with the SGPA of that semester and the CGPA earned till that semester.
- 1.14. **'University'**: University means the Central University of Haryana, Mahendergarh.
- 1.15. **'Vice-Chancellor'**: The Vice-Chancellor of the Central University of Haryana, Mahendergarh.

2. Eligibility for Admission:

"Eligibility for Admission to M. Pharm. Programme shall be as per the conditions prescribed by PCI as amended from time to time."

A candidate may be admitted to the first year / first semester of M. Pharm. programme if he/she has obtained a Bachelor's degree in Pharmacy provided that such a candidate has attained the minimum eligibility/qualification at the time of admission, as decided by the Pharmacy Council of India (PCI)/University from time to time. Currently the Eligibility for Admission as per PCI is:

B. Pharm degree examination of an Indian University established by law in India from an institution approved by Pharmacy Council of India and has scored not less than 55% of the maximum marks (aggregate of four years of B. Pharm). Provided that –

- a. There shall be reservation of seats for the students belonging to the Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes and Other Backward Classes in accordance with the instructions issued by the Central Government/State Government/Union Territory Administration, as the case may be, from time to time.
- b. For SC/ST candidates the prescribed percentage of marks will be 50% of the maximum marks (aggregate of four years of B. Pharm).
- c. Every student, selected for admission to postgraduate pharmacy course in any of the pharmacy institution in the country should have obtained Registration with the State Pharmacy Council or should obtain the same within one month from the date of his admission, failing which the admission of the candidate shall be cancelled.

3. Duration of the program

The program of study for M. Pharm. shall extend over a period of four semesters (two academic years). The curricula and syllabi for the program shall be as prescribed from time to time by Pharmacy Council of India.

4. Medium of instruction and examinations

Medium of instruction and examination shall be in English.

5. Working days in each semester

Each semester shall consist of not less than 100 working days. The odd semesters shall be conducted from the month of June/July to November/December and the even semesters shall be conducted from the month of December/January to May/June in every calendar year.

6. Attendance and progress

A candidate is required to put in at least 80% attendance in individual courses considering theory and practical separately. The candidate shall complete the prescribed course satisfactorily to be eligible to appear for the respective examinations.

7. Program/Course credit structure

As per the philosophy of Credit Based Semester System, certain quantum of academic work viz. theory classes, practical classes, seminars, assignments, etc. are measured in terms of credits. On satisfactory completion of the courses, a candidate earns credits. The amount of credit associated with a course is dependent upon the number of hours of instruction per week in that course. Similarly, the credit associated with any of the other academic, co/extracurricular activities is dependent upon the quantum of work expected to be put in for each of these activities per week/per activity.

7.1. Credit assignment

7.1.1. Theory and Laboratory courses

Courses are broadly classified as Theory and Practical. Theory courses consist of lecture (L) and Practical (P) courses consist of hours spent in the laboratory. Credits (C) for a course is dependent on the number of hours of instruction per week in that course, and is obtained by using a multiplier of one (1) for lecture and a multiplier of half (1/2) for practical (laboratory) hours. Thus, for example, a theory course having four lectures per week throughout the semester carries a credit of 4. Similarly, a practical having four laboratory hours per week throughout semester carries a credit of 2. The contact hours of seminars, assignments and research work shall be treated as that of practical courses for the purpose of calculating credits. i.e., the contact hours shall be multiplied by 1/2. Similarly, the contact hours of journal club, research work presentations and discussions with the supervisor shall be considered as theory course and multiplied by 1.

7.2. Minimum credit requirements

The minimum credit points required for the award of M. Pharm. degree is 95. However, based on the credit points earned by the students under the head of co-curricular activities, a student shall earn a maximum of 100 credit points. These credits are divided into Theory courses,

Practical, Seminars, Assignments, Research work, Discussions with the supervisor, Journal club and Co-Curricular activities over the duration of four semesters. The credits are distributed semester-wise as shown in Table 1. Courses generally progress in sequence, building competencies and their positioning indicates certain academic maturity on the part of the learners. Learners are expected to follow the semester-wise schedule of courses given in the syllabus.

8. Academic work

A regular record of attendance both in Theory, Practical, Seminar, Assignment, Journal club, Discussion with the supervisor, Research work presentation and Dissertation shall be maintained by the department / teaching staff of respective courses.

9. Course of study

The specializations in M. Pharm. Program shall be as prescribed by PCI from time to time.

The course of study for M. Pharm. specializations shall include Semester-wise Theory & Practical as prescribed by PCI from time to time. The number of hours to be devoted to each theory and practical course in any semester shall not be less than that prescribed by PCI. A general structure, based on current PCI norms, has been shown in table 2-4.

International Journal: The Editorial Board Outside India *The credit points assigned for extracurricular and or co-curricular activities shall be given by the Principals of the colleges and the same shall be submitted to the University. The criteria to acquire this credit point shall be defined by the colleges from time to time.

10. Program Committee

- a. The M. Pharm. programme shall have a Programme Committee constituted by the Head of the institution in consultation with all the Heads of the departments.
- b. The composition of the Programme Committee shall be as follows: A teacher at the cadre of Professor shall be the Chairperson; One Teacher from each M. Pharm specialization and four student representatives (two from each academic year), nominated by the Head of the institution.
- c. Duties of the Programme Committee:
 - i. Periodically reviewing the progress of the classes.
 - ii. Discussing the problems concerning curriculum, syllabus and the conduct of classes.
 - iii. Discussing with the course teachers on the nature and scope of assessment for the course and the same shall be announced to the students at the beginning of respective semesters.
 - iv. Communicating its recommendation to the Head of the institution on academic matters.
 - v. The Programme Committee shall meet at least twice in a semester preferably at the end of each sessional exam and before the end semester exam.

11. Examinations/Assessments

The schemes for internal assessment and end semester examinations are given in Table-6, 7.

11.1. End semester examinations

The End Semester Examinations for each theory and practical course through semesters I to IV shall be conducted by the respective university except for the subject with asterix symbol (*) in table 2-4 for which examinations shall be conducted by the subject experts at college level and the marks/grades shall be submitted to the university.

11.2.1. Sessional Exams

Two sessional exams shall be conducted for each theory / practical course as per the schedule fixed by the college(s). The scheme of question paper for theory and practical sessional examinations is given in the table. The average marks of two sessional exams shall be computed for internal assessment as per the requirements given in tables.

12. Promotion and award of grades

A student shall be declared PASS and eligible for getting grade in a course of M. Pharm. programme if he/she secures at least 50% marks in that particular course including internal assessment.

13. Carry forward of marks

In case a student fails to secure the minimum 50% in any Theory or Practical course as specified in 12, then he/she shall reappear for the end semester examination of that course. However, his/her marks of the Internal Assessment shall be carried over and he/she shall be entitled for grade obtained by him/her on passing.

14. Improvement of internal assessment

A student shall have the opportunity to improve his/her performance only once in the sessional exam component of the internal assessment. The re-conduct of the sessional exam shall be completed before the commencement of next end semester theory examinations.

15. Re-examination of end semester examinations

Re-examination of end semester examination shall be conducted as per the schedule given in table 10. The exact dates of examinations shall be notified from time to time.

16. Allowed to keep terms (ATKT):

No student shall be admitted to any examination unless he/she fulfils the norms given in 6. ATKT rules are applicable as follows:

A student shall be eligible to carry forward all the courses of I and II semesters till the III semester examinations. However, he/she shall not be eligible to attend the courses of IV semester until all the courses of I, II and III semesters are successfully completed.

A student shall be eligible to get his/her CGPA upon successful completion of the courses of I to IV semesters within the stipulated time period as per the norms.

Note: Grade AB should be considered as failed and treated as one head for deciding ATKT. Such rules are also applicable for those students who fail to register for examination(s) of any course in any semester.

17. Grading of performances

17.1. Letter grades and grade points allocations:

Based on the performances, each student shall be awarded a final letter grade at the end of the semester for each course. The letter grades and their corresponding grade points are given in Table – 11.

A learner who remains absent for any end semester examination shall be assigned a letter grade of AB and a corresponding grade point of zero. He/she should reappear for the said evaluation/examination in due course.

18. The Semester grade point average (SGPA)

The performance of a student in a semester is indicated by a number called 'Semester Grade Point Average' (SGPA). The SGPA is the weighted average of the grade points obtained in all the courses by the student during the semester. For example, if a student takes four courses (Theory/Practical) in a semester with credits C1, C2, C3 and C4 and the student's grade points in these courses are G1, G2, G3 and G4, respectively, and then students' SGPA is equal to:

$$\text{SGPA} = \frac{C1G1 + C2G2 + C3G3 + C4G4}{C1 + C2 + C3 + C4}$$

The SGPA is calculated to two decimal points. It should be noted that, the SGPA for any semester shall take into consideration the F and AB grade awarded in that semester. For example, if a learner has a F or AB grade in course 4, the SGPA shall then be computed as:

$$\text{SGPA} = \frac{C1G1 + C2G2 + C3G3 + C4*zero}{C1 + C2 + C3 + C4}$$

19. Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA)

The CGPA is calculated with the SGPA of all the IV semesters to two decimal points and is indicated in final grade report card/final transcript showing the grades of all IV semesters and their courses. The CGPA shall reflect the failed status in case of F grade(s), till the course(s) is/are passed. When the course(s) is/are passed by obtaining a pass grade on subsequent examination(s) the CGPA shall only reflect the new grade and not the fail grades earned earlier. The CGPA is calculated as:

$$\text{CGPA} = \frac{C1S1 + C2S2 + C3S3 + C4S4}{C1 + C2 + C3 + C4}$$

where C1, C2, C3, is the total number of credits for semester I, II, III, and S1, S2, S3, is the SGPA of semester I, II, III,

20. Declaration of class

The class shall be awarded on the basis of CGPA as follows:

21. Project work

All the students shall undertake a project under the supervision of a teacher in Semester III to IV and submit a report. 4 copies of the project report shall be submitted (typed & bound copy, not less than 75 pages).

22. Award of Ranks

Ranks and Medals shall be awarded on the basis of final CGPA. However, candidates who fail in one or more courses during the M. Pharm program shall not be eligible for award of ranks. Moreover, the candidates should have completed the M. Pharm program in minimum prescribed number of years, (two years) for the award of Ranks.

23. Award of degree

Candidates who fulfil the requirements mentioned above shall be eligible for award of degree during the ensuing convocation.

24. Duration for completion of the program of study

The duration for the completion of the program shall be fixed as double the actual duration of the program and the students have to pass within the said period, otherwise they have to get fresh Registration.

25. Revaluation/ Re-totalling of answer papers

There is no provision for revaluation of the answer papers in any examination. However, the candidates can apply for re-totalling by paying prescribed fee.

26. Re-admission after break of study

Candidate who seeks re-admission to the program after break of study has to get the approval from the university by paying a condonation fee.

27. Miscellaneous

27.1. Notwithstanding anything stated in this Ordinance, for any unforeseen issue arising, and not covered by this Ordinance, or in the event of any difference in interpretation, The Master of Pharmacy (M. Pharm) Course Regulations prescribed by the Pharmacy Council of India as amended from time to time shall be followed.

For any unforeseen issue arising, and not covered by the Pharmacy Council of India regulations, or in the event of any difference in interpretation, the Vice-Chancellor may take an appropriate decision.

CUH-Employees Welfare Fund Scheme

The Committee constituted for recommending modalities for setting up of CUH –Employees Welfare Fund Scheme and creation of an Employees Welfare Fund hereby recommends the draft of proposed Employees Welfare Fund Scheme after exhaustive study of existing provisions in various Central/State universities and deliberations. The draft Guidelines of the Scheme are submitted as under:

**Guidelines Relating to Setting up of CUH-Employees Welfare Fund Scheme and
Creation and Maintenance of Employees Welfare Fund (CUH-EWF)**

I. SHORT TITLE AND DATE OF COMMENCEMENT

- i. The Scheme may be titled as CUH-Employees Welfare Fund (CUH-EWF).
- ii. The Scheme shall come into force from the date of notification.

II. DEFINITIONS

- i. "Scheme" means CUH –Employees Welfare Fund Scheme
- ii. "University" here means Central University of Haryana, Mahendergarh
- iii. "Welfare Fund" here means CUH-Employees Welfare Fund
- iv. "Member" means a regular employee of the university who has been confirmed after completion of the probation period, and has consented to be the subscriber of the Employees Welfare Fund
- v. "Loan" here means the advance issued to the member for specific purpose as defined in appropriate clause of the CUH-Employees Welfare Fund guidelines

III. OBJECTIVES OF THE EMPLOYEES WELFARE FUND SCHEME

- i. To establish and manage a welfare fund for the employees created from subscriptions, contributions from members, deductions, donations and other sources. This fund will be used to provide financial assistance, advances or loans to the members of CUH-EWF or their dependents, and ex gratia financial relief in case of accidents, death, or crisis beyond ordinary measures, etc.
- ii. To mobilise savings and to help its members in obtaining advances, loans, financial relief and assistance as specified in appropriate clause of the guidelines of Scheme.

IV. MEMBERSHIP

All the regular employees of the university who have been confirmed after completion of the probation period, and have consented to be the subscriber of the CUH-Employees Welfare Fund, are eligible for the membership of CUH-EWF.

IV (A). CANCELLATION OF MEMBERSHIP

Membership of CUH-EWF shall be cancelled/discontinued in the following cases:

- a) Resignation from service

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- b) Resignation from membership of Employees Welfare Fund Scheme (if accepted by the Managing Committee)
- c) Retirement/superannuation
- d) Suspension from services
- e) Dismissal from services
- f) Expulsion from the membership of Employees Welfare Fund Scheme
- g) Insanity
- h) Bankruptcy
- i) Death and
- j) During the period in which his/her pay is attached by the court

IV (B). EXPULSION OF A MEMBER

A member may be expelled from the CUH-Employees Welfare Fund by a two-thirds majority in General Body meeting in the following cases:

- a) Persistent failure to pay subscription, loan instalment, or debt due from him/her to the Employees Welfare Fund (EWF) continuously for 6 months.
- b) Dishonesty in dealings with the CUH-EWF or actions contrary to the guidelines of the Welfare Fund Scheme.
- c) Conviction for criminal offence involving moral turpitude.

V. GENERAL BODY

- a) All the members of the Welfare Fund Scheme shall constitute the General Body.
- b) The General Body shall meet at least twice in a year and more meetings can be called as and when required by the Managing Committee.
- c) The Secretary shall give notice of at least 7 days for convening the meetings of the General Body.
- d) The statement of annual accounts, annual report and budget for the next year will be despatched/mailed to all the members along with other agenda items.
- e) 30 percent of the total members of CUH-EWF Scheme shall constitute quorum for the meeting of General Body.
- f) The General Body shall be the ultimate authority in all the matters relating to the administration of the CUH-EWF.

VI. MANAGING COMMITTEE

The CUH-Employees Welfare Fund Scheme shall be administrated and managed by the Managing Committee constituted under the guidelines.

1. Constitution of Managing Committee

- a) Five members of the Managing Committee shall be elected on the basis of direct voting through secret ballot by the subscribed members of the welfare fund scheme for the term of two years.
- b) Presidents of all registered associations/organisations of the university or their nominee.

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- c) The Registrar of the University shall fix the election schedule and finalise various forms for conducting elections to the managing committee members.
 - d) Registrar of the University shall be the ex officio Vice President of CUH-EWF Scheme.
 - e) President, Secretary and the Joint Secretary shall be elected by the members of the Managing Committee.
 - f) A Deputy Registrar/Senior Assistant Registrar of the University shall be the Treasurer (ex officio).
 - g) All the Ex-officio office bearers of the Managing Committee should be the members of the welfare fund scheme.
- 2. Meetings of the Managing Committee**
- a) The meetings of the managing committee shall be held once in three months or when the situation warrants with a notice of seven days.
 - b) Half of the members of the managing committee shall constitute the quorum.
 - c) There shall be no quorum for the meetings adjourned for want of quorum and scheduled after at least 10 days' time with proper communication to all the members. The same agenda shall be discussed in such meetings.
 - d) In case of emergent meetings, the notice of three days may be given through SMS, email or WhatsApp Message.
 - e) The managing committee shall be responsible for maintenance of Annual Accounts, Annual Reports, Budget Estimates and Register of proceedings to be placed in the meetings of General Body to be held at least twice in a year.
- 3. Powers and Functions of the Managing Committee**
- The Managing Committee shall exercise the following powers:
- a) To sanction all contingent expenses required for maintenance and management of Employees Welfare Fund Scheme for which the President shall be authorised to incur contingent expenditure up to a limit of Rs.5,000/- in anticipation of the formal sanction of the committee.
 - b) To generate revenue for the Employees Welfare Fund through contributions, donations, loans, deductions, etc.
 - c) To design and circulate the application for membership, loans/advances, etc.
 - d) To admit new members and to recommend the expulsion/discontinuation of membership for reasons recorded in writing.
 - e) To deal with application for loans, advances or financial assistance to members as per their entitlement.
 - f) To prepare and present the annual accounts, annual report, balance sheet and budget estimates.
 - g) To enter into contracts/agreements on behalf of the CUH-EWF Scheme, settle the terms thereof and to authorise an officer to execute all deeds, agreements, documents and to issue receipts in connection with the business of the CUH-EWF.

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- h) To institute, conduct, defend, compound or compromise any legal proceedings by or against the CUH-EWF.
- i) To appoint part-time/outsourced employees to manage the CUH-EWF Scheme on prior approval of the General Body, if necessary.
- j) To transact any other business of the CUH-EWF Scheme in accordance with norms.
- k) To make arrangements for the maintenance of the accounts and registers as prescribed from time to time.
- l) To design and circulate the application for membership, loans/advances, etc.

4. Registers and Books of Accounts

The following registers and books of accounts shall be maintained by the Managing Committee of CUH-EWF Scheme:

- a) Inventory of Registers and ledgers maintained by the Committee
- b) Register of members and monthly subscription
- c) A book of proceedings of the General Body and Managing Committee
- d) Register containing inspection notes of the designated officers
- e) Register of assets
- f) A cash book showing all receipts, payments and balance in hand maintained on day-to-day basis
- g) Passbook(s) of Bank Accounts and Financial Statements
- h) A ledger showing the accounts of each member of the CUH-EWF Scheme.
- i) All other relevant registers and books of accounts and loans which may be required to be maintained by Managing Committee of the CUH-EWF Scheme

VII. POWERS OF THE PRESIDENT, SECRETARY AND TREASURER

Subject to such resolutions as the Managing Committee may from time to time pass, the office-bearers of the CUH-EWF Scheme shall have the following powers:

1. President

- a) To preside over all general body meetings and meetings of the Managing Committee
- b) Shall exercise overall control of the affairs of the CUH Employees Welfare Fund Scheme
- c) In case of a tie, the President shall have a casting vote

2. Vice-President

The Vice-President shall assist the President in discharging of his duties, and shall discharge the responsibilities of the President in his absence.

3. Secretary

- a) To operate the bank accounts of the fund within the limits prescribed by the Managing Committee
- b) To organise and attend all the meetings of General Body and the Managing Committee
- c) To record the proceedings of such meetings and get them signed by the President and the Managing Committee members present in the meeting




- d) To provide all necessary information to members and the departmental officers and to make all correspondence on behalf of the CUH-EWF Scheme
 - e) To maintain and arrange the safe custody of the book of accounts and other registers
 - f) To receive applications for membership of the CUH-EWF Scheme, to maintain the record and place before the Managing Committee
 - g) To prepare the Annual Statement/Annual Report or any other reports to be placed before the Managing Committee or the competent authority of the University
- 4. Joint Secretary**
The Joint Secretary shall assist the Secretary in discharging of his duties, and to act as the Secretary in his/her absence.
- 5. Treasurer**
- a) To receive and acknowledge amounts on behalf of the CUH-EWF Scheme
 - b) To keep accurate and up to date record of amounts and books required to be maintained as per rules
 - c) To be responsible for the safe custody of money and other assets of the CUH-EWF Scheme

VIII. SOURCES OF FUNDS AND MANAGEMENT

Funds will be raised from the following sources:

- a) Initial contribution (as opening Corpus) from the university
- b) One-time Contribution from members as joining subscription in following order:

- c) Monthly subscription: 0.5% of basic salary
- d) 3% of the remuneration for all the activities of CUH including the following:
 - i. Evaluation of Answer Scripts, Dissertation, Thesis, Project, etc
 - ii. Setting of Question Papers, secrecy work, invigilation and evaluation centre work
 - iii. Conduct of Practical Examinations, Entrance Examination, Recruitment Test, End-term Examinations, and Result Preparations
- e) 3% of remuneration/honorarium of Project Investigator and his team
- f) 3% of amount earned by the PI/Co-PI or his team as remuneration/honorarium from consultancy

- g) 3% of the cash prize received by the member
- h) Any donation/contribution from any employee, society or outside agency/organisation
- i) Any other grant as may be approved by the University

The Finance Section will deduct the prescribed contribution and percentage of amount as listed at 'b' to 'g' above and transfer the same to the account of CUH-EWF Scheme. The financial year shall be from 1st April to 31st March.

The Treasurer shall be responsible for operating the funds and bank transactions. Every cheque will be signed by three designated members of Managing Committee including the President.

The funds shall be deposited in a nationalised bank branch preferably located in the University Campus in the name of CUH- Employees Welfare Fund Scheme.

IX. LOANS, ADVANCES AND FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

- a) The members of CUH-EWF Scheme shall be eligible for loans, advances and financial assistance as per their entitlements.
- b) Loans/advances may be granted for the following purposes:
 - i. Medical expenses for a disease/ailment whose cost of treatment is more than one lakh
 - ii. Marriage of self/dependent or ceremonial functions
 - iii. Education of Children

Note: *Advance/loan (except in case of health emergency) may be sanctioned only after clearance of all previous outstanding loans/advances of any nature.*

- c) In case of constraints of funds, the order of preference shall be as follows:
 - Medical Emergency
 - Marriage of Self/Dependent
 - Education of Children
- d) The maximum amount of loan entitled to a member is the last monthly contribution X 1000 which will be repayable in 36 EMIs without interest. The EMI for repayment shall be scheduled from the next month of the release of the advance.
However, in case of advances for the medical emergency of the self or the dependent, the EMI for repayment shall commence with the fitness issued by the Hospital or six months from the date of release of advance, whichever is earlier.
- e) In case of default in repayment of loans for more than six months, the member shall be disqualified from the membership of the fund and the due amount shall be recovered from his/her salary/retirement benefits as per the norms fixed by Government of India from time to time.
- f) The university administration shall obtain No-dues Certificate from the Secretary/President of the Managing Committee of CUH-EWF Scheme before finalizing his/her retirement benefits.

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X. WELFARE MEASURES

The member or his nominee shall be entitled to avail the following amount at the time of his/her retirement/resignation or demise as per the table below, depending upon the availability of funds after clearance of all the outstanding dues of CUH-EWF:

Sr. No.	Length of Service	Rate of amount payable
1.	Up to 10 years	1.25 times of total contribution of concerned employee
2.	Above 10 years but below 20 years	1.5 times of total contribution of concerned employee
3.	20 years and above	2 times of total contribution of concerned employee

XI. NOMINATION

Every member shall nominate a person or persons to whom money/liability due to him shall be transferred. When a member nominates more than one person, he/she shall specify the percentage of amount to be transferred or paid to each nominee.

If a member fails to nominate any person, the nominee(s) recorded in his/her service records shall be considered the legitimate nominee.

XII. RESPONSIBILITIES AND POWERS OF THE UNIVERSITY

- a) The University shall contribute an appropriate amount to create Employees Welfare Fund as may be required for the effective functioning of the CUH-EWF Scheme.
- b) The University shall provide the logistic support such as deduction of one-time membership fees, deduction of monthly membership subscription from salaries, recovery of instalments against loans from salaries, deduction of prescribed percentage of amount from various sources as mentioned at VIII('b' to 'i') and to provide office space with required facilities.
- c) The University may assign the management of the fund to a branch/ officer of the University, if the situation so warrants.
- d) The Vice Chancellor may call for any document, details of transactions etc. pertaining to the operation of CUH-EWF Scheme.
- e) The University may institute an enquiry upon the functioning or the financial transactions of CUH-EWF Scheme, if required.
- f) The Vice Chancellor may review the functioning of the CUH-EWF Scheme from time to time, and direct a special audit, if the situation so warrants.
- g) In case of any ambiguity in the interpretation of the guidelines, the decision of the Vice Chancellor shall be final.

All disputes shall be subject to the jurisdiction of the District Court, Mahendergarh and the Hon'ble Punjab and Haryana High Court at Chandigarh.

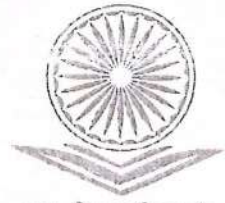



The Committee further felt that the need for retainer for at least three categories of cases i.e. Civil Cases, Criminal Cases and Services matters at least at the level of Punjab and Haryana High Court, Distt. Court, Narnaul and Civil Court, Mahendergarh.

It was brought to the knowledge of the Committee that two advocates are already working as retainer i.e. Sh. Sajjan Singh at High Court of Punjab and Haryana, Chandigarh and Sh. Moti Singh at Civil Court, Mahendergarh. In view of that, two more advocates at High Court level, two advocates at District Court, Narnaul and one advocate at Civil Court, Mahendergarh should be engaged as retainer.

In this regard, the Committee recommends as under:

1. At the level of High Court of Punjab and Haryana Level
 - i. Sh. Sajjan Singh (Sr. No. 3) For service matters
 - ii. Sh. Surender Pal (Sr. No. 5) For criminal matters
 - iii. Sh. Krishan Kumar Chahal (Sr. No. 19) For civil matters
2. At the level of District Court, Narnaul
 - i. Sh. Ashok Kumar (Sr No.03) Civil & service matters
 - ii. Sh. Jasbir Singh Dhillon (Sr No.04) Criminal matters
3. At the level of Civil Court, Mahendergarh
 - i. Sh. Moti Singh, (Sr. No. 01) Service and civil matters
 - ii. Sh. Jimmy Chaudhary (Sr. No. 02) Criminal matters


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The advocates engaged as retainer may be paid Rupees 10000/- per month at High Court Level and Rupees 5000/- at District Court and Civil Court Level.



CENTRAL UNIVERSITY OF HARYANA, MAHENDERGARH

(Established vide Act No. 25 (2009) of Parliament)

Empanelment of Legal Counsel(s) to represent the Central University of Haryana (CUH) before Supreme Court of India, Punjab & Haryana High Court, Chandigarh, Tribunals, District & Sessions Court, Mahendergarh at Narnaul and other judicial bodies within the territory of Union of India.

1. Empanelment of Legal Counsel(s)

The Central University of Haryana, an autonomous body of the Government of India established under the Central Universities Act, 2009 proposes to engage Legal Counsel(s) to represent the University before the Supreme Court of India, Punjab & Haryana High Court, Chandigarh, Tribunals, District & Sessions Court, Mahendergarh at Narnaul, Subordinate Court, Mahendergarh and any other judicial bodies within the territory of India.

The interested Counsels/Law companies/Firms and practicing advocates registered with Bar Council of India/State Bar Council having adequate experience in dealing with legal matters pertaining to academics/education/service matters/autonomous bodies are eligible for empanelment. The Qualification, Experience, Schedule of Fees, Other terms and conditions and the application format in which the application has to be made, have been prescribed, which is given below:


The Advocates/Law Firms who are on the existing panel of CUH shall cease to be on the panel of CUH after new panel is finalized against this notice. Therefore, they are also required to apply afresh to this notice.

Eligible Law Firms and practicing advocates may send their applications addressed to Registrar, Central University of Haryana, Jant-Pali, Mahendergarh in the format prescribed in Annexure "A" enclosed herewith alongwith all supporting documents (scanned) to the email id: legalcell@cuh.ac.in

The last date of receiving Applications in the prescribed format alongwith supporting documents is 6th October, 2020.

Only those who are ready to accept the terms and conditions in the notice shall be considered for empanelment. Applicants are required to mention Courts of jurisdiction wherein they want to represent Central University of Haryana.

Note: Applying for empanelment at CUH does not confer any right/assurance whatsoever that they will be empaneled on the panel of CUH. Letters to advocates confirming their empanelment will be issued by CUH separately.



Terms and Conditions for empanelment:

2. Eligibility of Empanelment:

(i) The Advocates/Firms should be familiar with various branches of law especially those concerning laws of matters related to land disputes, constitutional/service law, contract law, property laws and taxation, etc.

(ii) For empanelment with Central University of Haryana hereinafter referred to as CUH as Legal Counsel(s) an individual Advocate must have adequate experience as practicing Advocate and in case of firms, the Senior most Advocate/Partner/Associate of the firm must contest the case.

(iii) There would be a court specific empanelment i.e. for the Supreme Court of India, Punjab & Haryana High Court, Chandigarh, District & Sessions Court, Mahendergarh at Narnaul, Subordinate Courts, Mahendergarh Division.

(iv) For designation of an Advocate to handle the cases before all other courts/Tribunals/Forums/Commissions not mentioned above any advocate out of the panel drawn will be engaged as per requirement and suitability

3. Tenure of Empanelment:

The initial empanelment will be for five years or until further orders whichever is earlier. Performance of empaneled advocates shall be reviewed on annual basis. However, on completion of the term and satisfactory performance of the advocate, the empanelment may be renewed for a period of another five (5) years by the CUH as per the terms & conditions in effect at the time of renewal. The CUH reserves the right to terminate the empanelment of any advocate at any time without assigning any reason thereof.

4. Duties of the Counsel:

The counsel shall perform the following duties:

(i) Represent CUH before the Supreme Court of India, Punjab & Haryana High Court, Chandigarh, District & Sessions Court, Mahendergarh at Narnaul, Subordinate Courts, Mahendergarh Division, other judicial bodies, Tribunals, Forums and Commissions;


(ii) Provide legal advice to CUH on civil, criminal, service and such other matters arising in due course of administration of the University as are referred to him/her including:

(a) Examination and drafting of legal documents;

(b) Drafting of applications, petitions etc., to be filed in various courts of law;

(c) Prompt removal/curing of defects in appeals/petitions files; as may be pointed out by the registry;

(iii) Apply for the copy of judgment from the court in cases attended by him/her and supply the copy of judicial pronouncements at the earliest but not later than 10 days

from the date of order (excluding the time taken by the court in preparation of the copy);

(iv) If required, render all assistance to Special or Senior Counsel engaged in a particular case before the Supreme Court/ Punjab & Haryana High Court/ Tribunals/ Forums/ Commissions;

(v) Keep CUH informed and updated on all important developments in the designated cases, dates of hearing, order of the court on the date of its pronouncement, supplying copy of judgment etc;

(vi) Furnish monthly statement about the cases represented by him/her before Supreme Court, Punjab & Haryana High Court/ different judicial bodies/ Tribunals/ Forums/ Commissions or any other court/authority and their outcomes;

(vii) Perform such other duties of legal nature which may be assigned to him/her by CUH;

(viii) When any case assigned to him/her is decided against the University, give considered opinion regarding the advisability of filing an appeal from such a decision not later than 5 working days of the order.

5. General Instructions:

a. The size of the panel and number of Advocates in Panel shall be determined by the Competent Authority based on the requirement and quantum of work. The volume of work shall be assessed on the basis of the pending cases in the preceding year and the fresh cases likely to be added in the succeeding years.

b. Cases involving similar issues/points of law or otherwise interlinked or clubbed may be entrusted to the same Advocate as far as possible, while care shall be taken to avoid concentration of cases in the hands of one Advocate/a few advocates/law firm.

c. Refusal by any advocate to accept any work without any reasonable cause (e.g. on grounds of conflict of interest) may entail removal of such advocate from the panel.

d. The advocates shall accept the terms and conditions of the empanelment as determined by the CUH from time to time.

e. In case of empanelment of Law Firms, all the terms and conditions for empanelment of the individual Advocates shall apply mutatis mutandis to them.

f. The Advocate/firm shall not advise any party or accept any case against the CUH in which he/she has appeared or is likely to be called upon to appear for or advise which is likely to affect or lead to litigation against the CUH;

g. If the Advocate happens to be a partner of a firm of lawyers or solicitors, it shall be incumbent upon the firm not to take up any case against the CUH in any Court of Law/Tribunal/Commission/Forum or any case arising out of those cases e.g. appeals and revisions;

h. In cases where on the request of Deputy Commissioner of District Mahendergarh at Narnaul or any other competent authority of the State/Government of India,

interests of UOI/Government of Haryana have also to be protected, no extra fees shall be paid to the advocate to watch and safeguard the interests of UOI/Government of Haryana.

6. Payment of Fee and Other Conditions:

(i) The fee payable to the Advocates shall be governed by the Schedule of fee as annexed as Annexure-C with these guidelines as amended from time to time.

(ii) The Competent Authority shall have the right in exceptional cases to approve the payment of a higher fee than the fee mentioned in the annexed schedule keeping in view the importance of the matter and the labour and efforts put in by the advocate in a particular case. It shall also have the power to fix the fee for eventualities which have not been mentioned in the schedule till appropriate amendment is made in this regard in the Fee Schedule by the CUH.

(iii) No retainer fee shall be paid to any panel Advocate/law firm merely because such advocate/firm has been empaneled.

7. Procedure for Empanelment:

The Competent Authority will consider the applications for empanelment in terms of these guidelines only on merits keeping in view the requirement and interest of the University.

8. Communication of Empanelment:


After a decision to empanel the advocate is taken, a communication in writing to this effect shall be sent to the shortlisted Advocate/Firms as per Annexure-B with acknowledgment and acceptance due. The process of empanelment shall be completed immediately on the issuance of the letter as the offer was already made by the Advocate at the time of applying/interacting with the Committee and the offer has been accepted by the University.

9. Right to Private Practice:

The Counsel will have the right of private practice, which should not however, interfere with the efficient discharge of work of CUH but he/she shall not advise, hold briefs or appear against CUH before any authority, tribunal or court of law;

If the counsel happens to be a partner in a firm of lawyers or solicitors, it will be incumbent on the firm, not to take up any case against CUH in any court of law or;

Any other case arising in other courts out of cases pertaining to CUH e.g. appeals and revision in the High Court/ Supreme Court/ Commissions/Forum/ Tribunals.



10. Termination of appointment/resignation:

CUH reserves the right to terminate the appointment/empanelment of a Counsel with immediate effect in writing without assigning any reason. The counsel may also resign from the University Panel at any time.

CUH is free to engage any advocate of its own choice and an empaneled Advocate shall make no claim that he/she alone should be entrusted with CUH's legal matter(s).


11. Disablements:

Disablement on the part of the Advocate shall mean and include any of the following:

- (i) Giving false information in the application for empanelment;
- (ii) Handing over the brief or matter to another advocate without prior written permission of the CUH;
- (iii) Failing to attend the hearing of the case without any sufficient reason and/or prior information;
- (iv) Not acting as per CUH's instructions or going against specific instructions;
- (v) Not returning the brief when demanded or not allowing or evading to allow its inspection on demand;
- (vi) Misappropriation of the CUH's funds or earmarkings, using the same towards his fee without CUH's permission;
- (vii) Threatening, intimidating or abusing any of the CUH's employees, officers, or representatives;
- (viii) Making any of his associates or juniors to appear on behalf of any of the opposite parties in cases/appeal related to CUH;
- (ix) Committing an act that tantamounts to contempt of court or professional misconduct;
- (x) Conviction of the Advocate in any offence resulting into arrest or detention or disbarment by the Bar Council;
- (xi) Passing on information relating to CUH's case on to the opposite parties or their advocates or any third party which is likely to cause any damage to the CUH's interests;
- (xii) Giving false or misleading information to the CUH relating to the proceedings of the case; and
- (xiii) Seeking frequent adjournments and/or not objecting the adjournment moved by other party without sufficient reason.

Empanelment shall be liable to be cancelled due to occurring of any of the above disablements on the part of the Advocate.

12. Doubt/Ambiguity:



If there arises any doubt/ambiguity with respect to the implementation/interpretation of any clause of these guidelines, the same shall be placed before Vice-Chancellor, CUH and his decision in this regard shall be final and binding.

13. Other Powers

The University reserves the right to take away a case assigned to a particular advocate/firm and may assign it to some other advocate/firm from the panel or even outside the panel if it deems fit that the case is not properly represented/not responding to the representative of the Legal Cell/other authorities deputed for the purpose or in case the Advocate/Firm expresses their inability to fight the case.

The University can even hire the services of any other advocate(s) apart from the panel of Legal Counsel(s) on any amount of payment as per the severity of the case, it deems fit in order to protect the rights of the University in any case. The panel should give due respect to the decision of the University and they ought to provide their legal advice and support to that advocate in case the University asks them to assist that Advocate.

The University may also appoint any of the Advocate from the panel or even outside the panel to receive the Petitions/Summons/Notices/Orders from a court on behalf of the University and take appropriate steps on the same in consultation with the University.

In every case, the decision of the University is final and binding upon each advocate/firm.





8. You will keep CUH informed about the developments in the matters entrusted to you.







❖ Teaching and Learning

Remaining conscious of the fact that pedagogical practices determine the learning experiences and influence the learning outcomes, the university adopts quality improvement strategies in teaching-learning process through innovative pedagogies and engaging learning environment to ensure holistic development of students. The teaching-learning strategies are revisited and syllabus is revised at regular intervals to maintain and sustain the interest of the learners. The students are trained not only in the domain of their subject but they are also given opportunities to develop multidisciplinary understanding through Choice-based Credit System wherein the students have the liberty to choose the general elective courses of their choices. The University has even reviewed its teaching – learning strategies to deal with the challenges posed by corona pandemic.

❖ **Examination and Evaluation:** The implementation of E-Governance in the Examination is very essential keeping in mind the complexity and timely delivery of services to the students. As of now the branch is putting efforts in making automation in all the activities and following e-governance initiation have been undertaking:-

1. Student registration to subjects/credits for all the semester.
2. Examination form is fully online.
3. Result publishing and tabulation is partially automated but fully computerized.
4. Question paper setting is fully digital/online.
5. National Academic Depository is implemented.

6. Conduct of Examination and secrecy is done with

8. All the marks cards and degree certificate are having more than five latest security features.
9. Student record is maintained in soft copy.

❖ **Research and Development:**

Some of the important quality improvement strategies pursued by the University in research and development include— adoption of UGC (Minimum Standards and Procedure for Award of M.Phil./Ph.D Degrees) Regulations, 2016 and UGC (Promotion of Academic Integrity and Prevention of Plagiarism in Higher Educational Institutions) Regulations, 2018; admissions in research programmes through Central Universities Common Entrance Test (CUCET); Annual Best Researcher Award for Faculty; provision of minimum residency period of two years for Ph.D programme; and zero tolerance against plagiarism and intellectual theft. The University provides financial assistance, in the form of Non-NET Fellowship, to all the research scholars who are not covered under Junior Research Fellowship. In addition, the facility to check thesis/dissertation/projects/papers for faculty plagiarism through Turnitin and individual user licences of Urkund plagiarism detection software for students are provided. Regular training programmes/workshops are organised to train researchers on writing effective research papers, undertaking research projects, etc.

❖ **Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation**

University Library is facilitating more number of digital resources that are accessible remotely that too at full-text level. For the effective use of the subscribed e-resources, the Library is organizing more number of user literacy programmes. This approach has increased the usage of resources. The ICT Section of the University is facilitating hardware and software that are necessary for teaching and learning processes. The virtual classrooms are effectively utilized for creating e-content and the same is being uploaded on the University website for wider use of resources.

- ❖ **Admission of Students:** The University now offers 48 programmes of study under 31 departments and 7 Schools of Study with enrolment of more than 2600 students. Besides, the University Grants Commission has granted the permission for introduction of three new academic programmes, namely LL.B, M.Pharma and M.P.Ed. The University offers admission through Central Universities Common Entrance Test (CUCET). With quality parameters for the admission process in place, at the age of 11, the Central University of Haryana now boasts of being NAAC accredited Grade 'A' university, having more than 40 % of students from 25 different states other than Haryana. Also, the University has always been successful in maintaining encouraging enrolment of female students and there is a constant increase in the number of female students. The University's focus on the promotion of diversity, inclusivity, and outreach.
